

Long-time parishioner Virginia Jansen celebrated her 100th birthday during St. Bartholomew's 100-year anniversary. On April 30, she welcomed 60 guests to a party held in her honor in St. Bartholomew's "Pope Room" organized by her daughters Patty Kowal and Judy Grider. Family and friends came from as far south as Rosemount and as far north as Blaine. Even her favorite nephew from Texas showed up to surprise her! Among the guests were St. Bart's parishioners Bob and Cindy Bauer who drove Virginia to church for 10 years. During the last three years Cindy has brought the Eucharist to Virginia in her Assisted Living home in Minnetonka, a lasting friendship that has benefited both through the years.



Virginia specifically wanted her party at St. Bart's stating she has spent so many years in the development of the church from 1955 when it was the original church (built in 1917) and then when the new church was built

in 1961. She volunteered her time on the funeral committee and she and her husband Fred brought up their daughters in the church where they received 5 Holy Sacraments. In 2000 her husband of 45 years was buried from St. Bart's and she has remained a faithful monthly contributor to the church and its goals.

Special memories Virginia recalls when thinking on the past include Fr. Demetrius Hagmann, who she remembers fondly when he would take time to visit with the school children during recess. He was well liked by all she recalls. She also has fond memories of Charlie Lachowitz who was studying to be a priest and volunteered his time at St. Bart's as a table leader during the Catholic Church's RENEW Program. Virginia remembers with a smile what a special event it was when Charlie was ordained and then celebrated his first Mass at St. Bart's.

When asked what she enjoyed most about St. Bart's, Virginia did not hesitate to say, listening to Richard Clarke play the organ during the Christmas and Easter Masses and all of the Masses in between. The Halleluiah Chorus is by far her favorite and holds a special spot in her heart.

IGNITE YOUR FAITH ...OUR JOURNEY CONTINUES

We just completed the Study Phase and are half way through our two-year spiritual campaign, *Ignite Your Faith*. Here is a recap of some of the more recent events.

Rediscover Jesus

One of the main goals of the Study phase was to commit to read and study our faith each day. So it was fitting after each Mass on Palm Sunday weekend parishioners received Matthew Kelly's book *Rediscover Jesus*. Kelly organized each chapter so that it would be easy to read one a day. It includes a reflection and prayer at the end of each chapter. Many people found it to be a simple, yet powerful read.

Catechism 101

Parishioners were treated to an evening with our very own Andrew Allen and Connor Flanagan. Andrew and Connor facilitated a discussion about the Catechism of the Catholic Church and how the greatest love story ever told, that of God's love, we received from the Church. It is passed on to us through the three-legged stool of revelation: Sacred Scripture, Sacred Tradition, and the Magisterium, the teaching authority of the church. The Catechism is a summary of the whole of Scripture through the Magisterium, and is to be viewed side by side with scripture.

The Catechism can look like an intimidating book to read, but it can be broken down into four, organized sections or pillars. Andrew and Connor shared:

Pillar 1: Our belief, the profession of faith, the Creed, and the story of God.

Pillar 2: The celebration of the Christian mystery through the liturgy and the sacraments. It is how we enter the story.

Pillar 3: How we live, our life in Christ, and is our part in the story.


Pillar 4: Christian prayer, our life of prayer, and our friendship with God.

You may be asking "how do I go about reading it?" Or, "what do all those numbers mean?" Here are some practical tips for reading the Catechism.

- The Catechism is broken down into paragraphs. Each paragraph has a bold number.
- The non-bold numbers in the margins refer to other related paragraphs.
- Take advantage of the index. Note that of the 904 pages of the big green Catechism, 215 are index pages. This may also make it a little less intimidating.
- One approach is to read a passage from scripture, then find it in the Index of Citations in the Catechism. That index will then direct you to the paragraphs that relate to that scripture passage.
- Another approach is to use the subject index to search for paragraphs related to a particular subject, like forgiveness, for example.
- There is also an index of abbreviations and a glossary to aid you.



The fundraising gala, which is depended on each year for ongoing operations and parish ministries, raised more than \$75,000 for our parish.

In recognition of St. Bartholomew’s 100 years, this year’s theme was “St Bart’s Centennial Cruise” and was fashioned like the Captain’s Dinner on a Mediterranean cruise with foods from the region and nautical decor. A Growing Hunger Satisfied

*Blessed are those who hunger...for they shall
be satisfied! (Matthew 5:6)*

It started with a grumbling stomach at one of our first inquiry meetings last summer. Charlotte, a delightfully cheerful person seeking to complete her Catholic initiation, came up with the idea to take turns bringing dinner to our sessions. Later, both Charlotte and Erin (the one with the grumbling stomach) also requested a bible study component to their summer inquiry, which led to a close reading of the Gospel of Mark. As you can see, hunger was a common theme for the early RCIA inquirers: a hunger for community (what better way to get to know others than around a meal) and a hunger to understand and grow in the Catholic faith!

This thoughtful and engaged disposition, and desire to reach out to others in community was a common quality among all of this year's group of candidates seeking to enter the Church and/or complete their initiation. Through each passing phase

of the RCIA process the group grew closer through sincere discussion, through engaged learning about their faith, and through a common desire to grow closer to Christ in the Church. Together, they experienced Christ fully in the Sacraments of Confirmation and Eucharist at the Easter Vigil. It is an inspiration to witness what happens when people put Christ at the center of their interactions; their deepest hunger is satisfied.

We as a parish community are blessed to have Toni Knadle, Charlotte Polich, Jason Rudolph, Scott Paulsen, and Erin Shepperd among us and pledge to help them grow and mature in the Christian life. Please pray for all those who God has called us to join us as we continue on our pilgrimage to our Father in Heaven.



A Proud Tradition of Achievement for All

Just as so many proud St. Bart's families wrap up graduation celebrations and prepare to send their recent graduates off to college, our friends at the Banyan Community in Minneapolis also recently celebrated the graduations of five high school seniors who will head off to college in the fall. We join in congratulating and celebrating these young adults and the educational desire they have demonstrated. For the past 18 years St. Bartholomew parishioners have equipped these Banyan students with the supplies necessary to walk into their classroom prepared and ready to go. Years and years of this add up to GRADUATION and that is something to celebrate!

What's unusual about this similar experience of celebrating high school graduations and plans for college is that this isn't the experience for most in the Phillips neighbor of Minneapolis. Fifty two percent of children in this neighborhood live in poverty. Many adults struggle to find work as the unemployment rate for the neighborhood hovers around 14 percent. Only 57 percent of students graduate from high school. Yet Banyan youth graduate from high performing high schools at a

100 percent rate and receive an average of three college acceptances. Most are the first in their family to attend college, often the first to graduate high school.

The Banyan Community has grown over the past 18 years and just last year moved into a beautiful new building that offers better space to service even more youth and their families. This year 150 K-12 Banyan students will head to school in the fall with supplies and uniforms provided by St. Bart's parishioners. These supplies are our way to offer our support and nurture the educational desire in these youth. By equipping them with the right tools year after year, the Banyan kids walk into class prepared and with the tools they need to perform their best.

Years and years of this effort result in graduations and college opportunities for youth who otherwise may not have found that path. The Banyan now proudly claims 44 high school graduates and 13 college graduates. The St. Bartholomew community shares in the joy of these young peoples' achievements after years of encouraging and nurturing that education desire by equipping them with the necessary tools.
