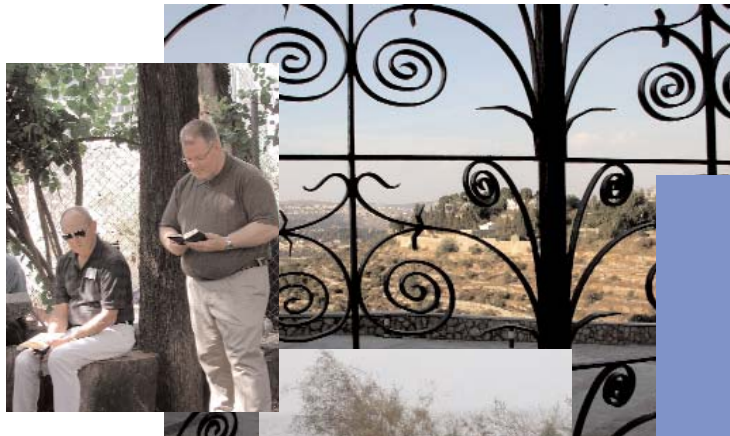
## Holy Land Reflections during Holy Week

Although their last trip to the Holy Land was seven years ago, for parishioners Mary Conklin, Joan Semmer, and Jennifer Shaltz, the experiences are still fresh. During this time of Lent and Easter, they take a moment to share some of their reflections and thoughts about why you may want to join the next pilgrimage, which Fr. Michael is leading from October 26 - November 7, 2009.

### During this time of Lent and Easter, what moments from your trip to the Holy Land are particularly poignant?

After Jesus was condemned by Pontius Pilate, he was lowered by rope into an isolated cell reserved for political prisoners. To see the entrance hole where his body was lowered, and to experience first hand the darkness of the cell, created a rush of emotion and sadness. To touch the stone where the body of Jesus was laid out and washed for burial created intimacy and sadness.

### How have your visits to certain sites influenced how you observe Lent, participate in the Triduum and celebrate Easter?

Holy Week liturgies are much more meaningful after having retraced virtually all of Jesus' steps: the path he walked on his entrance into Jerusalem, the upper room where he celebrated his Last Supper with his apostles, the garden of Gethsemane where he pondered his fate, the Antonia fortress where he was held before his trial, Golgatha—the site of his crucifixion, and the Garden Tomb from which he arose.

# New Stations of the Cross Dedicated

Father Michael has written about the devotion of the Stations of the Cross in his bulletin columns, and he has given us the history of how the practice developed and was finally brought inside the church building as pictures on the wall.

The Liturgical Arts Committee had some discussion about the Stations of the Cross early on in the building renovation process. In the spring and early summer 2008, the committee decided that it was time to focus on the Stations and a target for installation was set for Ash Wednesday 2009, providing funds were raised. Because there were no walls that could be used we determined from the start that if we wanted Stations with movement between them they'd have to be set in the floor. The committee had to consider materials (would be walked on), size (the size of the floor tiles replaced), location (spaced around the church), and design.

**THE DESIGN!** Many of us grew up with Stations of the Cross on the walls that were relief scenes, which were painted, carved or molded. That would not work well in the floor if they were to be walked on. Internet searches did not produce any useable ideas.

A day at the University of St. Thomas and the College of St. Catherine's libraries was more productive. We brought back some pictures as well as a book, *The Way of the Cross*, by Caryll Houselander, published in 1955. Houselander's original

illustrations had what the committee had been looking for—something simple, symbolic, and thought-provoking that could be etched into a metal floor plate.

We received permission from the current publisher to use the designs and the rest is history. A suitable material (bronze plate) was determined, the exact placement of each Station was set, production was available locally, and an invitation extended to parishioners to sponsor a Station. In two weekends the fourteen Stations as well as the words of Jesus to Bartholomew across the threshold were all sponsored. Installation was finished by Ash Wednesday 2009, on time and paid for.

The Dedication of the Stations of the Cross, led by Fr. Michael, Deacon Rick, and Martha Franco, was held the first Friday of Lent, followed by the devotion of praying the Stations together. Throughout the Lenten season, parishioners have prayed the Stations together each Friday evening and many have also taken the opportunity to enjoy a delicious soup supper, provided by St. Bart's high school faith formation students. People are also welcome to pray the Stations on their own.

# The Best Kept Secret in the Catholic Faith!

## Cursillo

**H**ave you heard of Cursillo? If you want to experience unconditional love, peace and harmony, consider a Cursillo retreat. We consider it the best kept secret in the Catholic faith. Cursillo is a three-day retreat that brings you closer to God and the Catholic faith.

The retreat is amazing and is set up for you to experience the love of Jesus. It is a life changing experience!

The Cursillo retreat, which started in Spain and was brought to the United States in 1943, is experienced in two parts. First, the men go to the weekend and spend three days on the retreat. You will sleep, eat and learn about Jesus. Then the women will go a week later and experience the same. You will meet incredible people and will establish a strong relationship with other Christians.

### Details of Cursillo

The Cursillo Movement is introduced over a consecutive 72-hour period called a "Three Day Weekend." During the three day weekend, which begins Thursday evening and ends Sunday evening, a team of religious and lay personnel present a series of talks to the candidates and the

entire group calls upon the Holy Spirit for enlightenment and guidance. The team and candidates live as a small Christian community during the weekend and discuss these talks in small groups. The discussions provide an opportunity to share insights about the presentations and hear how others have received that same presentation. The talks and discussions cover a variety of topics including:

- Meaning of grace and sacraments
- Importance of prayer and the study of God
- Christian leadership and living Christianity in community
- Our call to bring Christ to others and transform the very environments in which we live
- The importance of supporting one another in our efforts to live a truly Christian life

Throughout the weekend the participants pray together, attend daily Mass and have an opportunity to receive the sacrament of reconciliation. Typically by the end of the weekend, candidates have a deeper relationship with Jesus Christ and a better

understanding of the power of the Holy Spirit. Candidates leave the weekend as "curillestas" called to spread the Word of God.

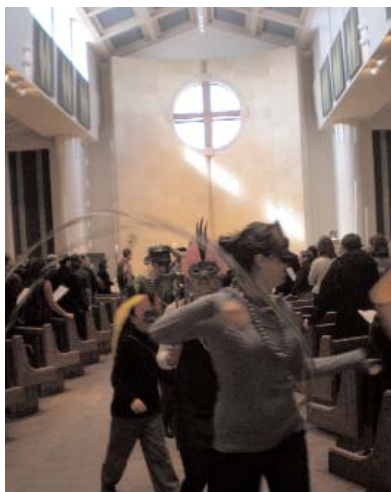

**B**y giving, sharing and contributing you are committing to the highest understanding of your calling as a steward. This is to know God's love for you through sacrificial giving.

- There are 1,400 registered households at St. Bartholomew.
- 423 households have made a financial pledge in support of the mission and ministry at St. Bartholomew for a total of \$964,818 toward the Sunday Giving budget of \$1,500,000.
- Five households have responded they are unable to pledge at this time, but will continue to contribute.
- Out of 1,400 registered households 1,129 households contributed financially to Sunday Giving in 2008.
- 102 households are presently using ACT (Automatic Contributions Transfer), contributing approx. \$17,527 monthly.

- Approximately 60 percent of the operating budget is funded by Sunday Giving.

### The Farmer and the Corn

James Bender, in his book *How to Talk Well* (McGraw-Hill, 1994), relates the story of a farmer who grew award-winning corn.

Each year he entered his corn in the state fair where it won a blue ribbon. One year a newspaper reporter interviewed him and learned something interesting about how he grew it.

The reporter discovered that the farmer shared his seed corn with his neighbors. "How can you afford to share your best seed corn with your neighbors when they are entering corn in competition with yours each year?" the reporter asked.

"Why, sir," said the farmer, "didn't you know? The wind picks up pollen from the ripening corn and swirls it from field to field. If my neighbors grow inferior corn, cross-pollination will steadily degrade the quality of my corn. If I am to grow good corn, I must help my neighbors grow good corn."

The farmer is very much aware of the connectedness of life. His corn cannot improve unless his neighbor's corn also improves.

So it is in other dimensions. Those who choose to be at peace must help their neighbors to be at peace. Those who choose to live well must help others to live well; for the value of a life is measured by the lives it touches. And those who choose to be happy must help others to find happiness, for the welfare of each is bound up with the welfare of all.

The lesson for each of us is this: If we are to grow good corn, we must help our neighbors grow good corn.

# Sending Happiness into Hearts

Random acts of kindness are often the result of people having had a kind deed done to or for them or someone close to them, without the expectation of recognition. This was the impetus for the St. Bartholomew School fourth graders in my class to write to ill parishioners.

When my mother was very ill, two students from her parish wrote her letters and sent her handmade cards. She was unable to read them herself or to respond. Yet, when I read them to her, she smiled and appeared more alert. I was so grateful to those students for adding some joy to my mother's frail life, and I wrote back to them for her. After her death, I went to the school, met the students, and thanked them again for their kindness to her.

Christine Ducharme, Director of Pastoral Ministry at St. Bart's, introduced the names of the parishioners who she thought would enjoy receiving letters from students. Since

October, these students have written and sent Halloween, Thanksgiving, Christmas, Valentine's Day, and St. Patrick's Day cards. Among the things students have written about are learning the mysteries of the rosary, that they are praying for him or her, and that all fourth graders went to "Feed

My Starving Children" to pack food for the hungry.

### The Gift of Sharing

Christine had been looking for a way to introduce a new ministry that bridges the school and seniors who are interested in school involvement so this idea came as a timely and welcome surprise. Hopefully, the pen pal program will lead to an ongoing and rewarding relationship.

The results of the pen pal program have been a joy to watch unfold. Some people have written back, thanking the students for their letters, cards and prayers. Comments include: "It put a smile on my face and happiness in my heart" and "Learning your religion and praying are very important in life." Also, we have heard back that they believe the prayers added to their healing and recovery.

An extra blessing was a visit from Mrs. Lilyanne Garden, to whom two fourth grade students have been writing. She visited the classroom one morning to thank the students for their prayers, telling the class how much they helped her recover. She told them how important Catholic education was to her son's success in life. Mrs. Garden's son, Warren, went to St. Bartholomew School for seventh and eighth grade many years ago and was friends with Cookie Klapprich and his brother, Kurt. (Ironically, Kurt's son, Kyle, is in my classroom and was introduced to Mrs. Garden.)

### The Gift of Prayer

The students include the parishioners in classroom morning prayers. Some parents have said that their child also prays for his or her special person during nightly prayers. The students have said they believe they're helping others get happier and healthier. It feels like "the right thing to do" to help someone else and is a good way to reach out to someone and do a corporal work of mercy.

Mrs. Garden has become a new friend to our fourth grade class and had her picture taken with the students following a Wednesday morning school Mass. They look forward to seeing her at Mass. She is an acknowledgement of the importance of our stewardship and faith in action.

## St. Bart's School Accreditation Renewed

The Minnesota Nonpublic School Accrediting Association (MNSAA) has renewed the accreditation of St. Bartholomew Catholic School for the eligibility period of 2009 to 2016. Accreditation is a voluntary method of quality assurance with a goal to evaluate, validate, and improve each school's quality.

Schools are accredited based on their compliance with a set of rigorous standards which identify essential personnel, teaching, facility, curriculum, governance, and marketing policies and practices that are considered necessary for an effective school. The accreditation process includes the creation of a visionary and focused strategic plan and an on-site visit by a team of educators from member schools. Accreditation with MNSAA relies heavily on how the individual school defines its mission and the way it seeks to accomplish that mission.

### What does this mean to St. Bartholomew?

It means you can rest assured St. Bart's students are receiving a quality education.

- Students are taught by qualified teachers;
- The curriculum is rigorous and integrated with best professional practices;
- Our school complies with State of Minnesota guidelines for safety and well-being; and
- Oversight is provided by a concerned governing body.

It means that the quality of our educational program is nationally recognized and that we go beyond state requirements and hold ourselves accountable for meeting nationally recognized standards of excellence.

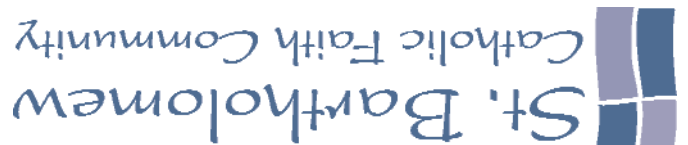
