


Get to Know Fr. John Klockeman



Tell us a little about your childhood/family/origin (e.g. siblings, parents, family, church, what were some experiences growing up?):

I am the fifth born of six children. I have three older sisters and two brothers. My parents are both deceased, as well as one sister and one brother. I grew up in West Saint Paul, worshipped at Saint Joseph Catholic Church, and graduated from Henry Sibley High School. I have wonderful memories of growing up with a block full of big families, creating games, spending hours and hours playing and bike riding outside during summer. They were carefree days of creativity and friendship. They were days in which no one seemed to lock their doors, windows open at night for cool air, and the dependability of mom and dad providing love, discipline, and

presence. Since my sisters were older than the boys, they often, to their dismay, were a second mother to us. Today, my siblings, relish these times.

What hopes or dreams do you have for your ministry at St. Bartholomew Catholic Church and School?

Of course, as a spiritual father or pastor, I want to build upon the success of what has made St. Bart's alive as a believing community. Building relationships with fellow parishioners will be of upmost importance, which builds trust for going deeper in Christ and demonstrative in our Catholic faith in loving God and neighbor and raising up the next generation in the faith. I think it imperative that each and every person comes to a solid relationship with Christ, lives their identity daily as sons and daughters by grace of God the Father, and is not only filled with the Holy Spirit, but matures in prayer and the gifts of the Spirit.

What are you most looking forward to experiencing in the Wayzata area?

Of course, the lake! Running and biking trails are a plus. I would like to be a visible figure in the area who reaches out to others through conversation, invitation to grow in the Faith, and through my presence as a priest. Interpersonal relationships have a strong impact on bringing others to Christ and His Church. I am hoping that God will not only use me in such a way but will highlight and strengthen the draw of our parish for others looking for purpose, wholeness, integrity, wisdom, and completion which can only be found fully in Christ Jesus.

Tell us about your Faith Journey and calling to Priesthood:

My mother said she knew I would be a priest since I was three years old, but I didn't awaken to that reality until well into my twenties. Profound influences in my life were young adults alive with joy in their faith, re-catechesis of my faith through Life Teen and the Newman Center at Arizona State University, and the deep influence of Father Doug Lorig, who became, only after my own father, a father-figure/mentor to me. He is perhaps the holiest priest I have personally known. He guided me to a deepened, intimate relationship with God, freedom in Christ, and how to listen to the promptings of the Holy Spirit. It was during Mass, at the elevation of the Holy Eucharist by the priest, that an invitation to the call of the priesthood was spoken internally to me. That invitation grew and was confirmed through other unsolicited and deeply profound, personal spiritual experiences of the Holy Trinity in my life. I cannot conclude without acknowledging the benefit of the frequent reception of the sacraments, daily prayer, and an outpouring of the Holy Spirit in my life. Holiness is a daily decision, privilege, and one of continued growth.

What are your favorite ways to pray?

Lectio Divina and, the ancient Christians prayer, called Prayer from the Heart. I am desirous to teach the good parishioners of St. Bart's how to deepen their relational prayer to God, to discern His voice from their own, and how to discern the movements of the heart as we mature in our mutual discipleship in Christ.

Favorite scripture passage/verse? And why is it meaningful to you?

A few come to mind: John 10:10 "I have come to give you life and to the full;" Luke 12: 49 "I have come to light a fire on the earth. How I wish the blaze were ignited!;" Galatians 2:20 "I have been crucified with Christ, and the life I live now is not my own; Christ is living in me. I still live my human life, but it is a life of faith in the Son of God, who loved me and gave himself for me;" and, Colossians 3: 12-14. These verses from Sacred Scripture motivate me to form activated disciples for Christ who, by their lived witness, draw others to the beauty and power of our Catholic faith.

What inspires you (especially on a day when you need it most)?

Working out, a good nap, a good day's work well-done, and, in particular, seeing others grow visibly in their faith by being rooted in a life in Christ, in the freedom and purpose He brings to life, and the self-discovery of their own potential.

What are your favorite way(s) to relax?

I enjoy meaningful conversations, relaxing outside, long walks or runs, and just enjoying time with others over meals or coffee.

What brings you joy (or puts a smile on your face)?

Relaxing in prayer or enjoying nature. I find it quite refreshing to be with authentic people who share their lives, their skills, and are open to developing friendships rooted in faith.

What are your favorite pastimes?

Listening to music, cooking/dinners out, exercise, and time spent with others assisting them to grow in holiness, wholeness and excellence as a person in their relationships, their marriages, and their relationship with God.

Do you enjoy sports? (watching, playing, etc....)

I enjoy running, working out (mostly cardiovascular), and watching college sports once the playoffs are on TV. College sports, I find, are much more exciting and authentic than many of the professional sports.

Do you enjoy being out-and-about or are you more of a homebody?

I do enjoy social events, dinners, and being outside. That being said, I do enjoy reading, continuous learning, and conversational learning.

Favorite TV show(s):

HGTV Fixer Upper. I so enjoy the Gaines family honoring each other and their healthy interaction between the mom and dad with their children. In addition to that, I do find intriguing any of the CSI series.

Favorite Movie(s):

Lord of the Rings, Bourne Trilogy, The 10 Commandments, Jesus of Nazareth, and the Sound of Music (I was in the play in high school).

Favorite music (secular and sacred):

In general, popular music that is upbeat, Christian praise and worship music, and polyphony choral music. I am not interested in novelty, but classic music that stands the test of time and engages the human heart to be raised up to greater heights of excellence and faith.

Favorite food(s):

Thai, Indian, Vietnamese, Spanish and Italian food. I love food that is flavorful and well-crafted. And, that doesn't mean it has to be high-end. Some of the best food I have had is homemade or from mom-and-pop shops.

Where is your favorite place in the world? In Minnesota?

I had the privilege to travel to Tanzania and engage in a day hike up Mount Kilimanjaro. That being said, I love the scenic beauty of Austria. It is an incredible nation of natural beauty and architecture. In Minnesota, I would say that my favorite place is by any body of water whether in the cities or in the country.

Where is a place you would love to travel?

I have a few: on safari in South Africa, plus Argentina to ride horses in the Pampas region. I would enjoy the quaint villages in Wales, going to Australia, and seeing the winter palace in Saint Petersburg. As an extreme side note (no pun intended), I would love to go to Antarctica. Stateside, I would enjoy hiking the many Utah national parks, and to see the sequoias in California.

What are some of your pet peeves (e.g. loud chewing, showing up late, etc....)
